1. INSIDE ROME

1.1 The Spanish-Portuguese Promoters reflect on “a piecemeal World War III.” On January 14, during their monthly meeting at the UISG office, the Spanish-Portuguese JPIC Promoters reflected on the words of Pope Francis during the commemoration of World War I, when he referred to “A piecemeal World War III.” By using the classical methodology of See–Judge–Act the reflection started with a brief video highlighting recent events featured in mainstream news—Syrian-Iraq conflict, Russian-Ukraine conflict, Terroristic violence in Northern Nigerian and France. The Judge part referred to Chapter 11 of the *Compendium of Social Teaching of the Church* followed by a reflection by Carmen Elisa, guided from Ignacio Ellacuria’s book. The Act part was a group discussion (in small groups and plenary session) on what can we do as Religious men and women. Material for this reflection will soon be uploaded on www.jpicroma.org.

1.2 Update on Anti Trafficking WG activities.

On January 21st, 26 English JPIC promoters met during their monthly session. The meeting was animated by the Anti-trafficking Working Group of the JPIC Commission. Using the See–Judge–Act pastoral cycle method they presented the reality and challenges facing Religious men and women during an era in which the world is witnessing the worst record of people who are trafficked and enslaved. A [video](#) video and [slide presentation](#) showed that slavery is the most lucrative crime in our recent history. In the Judge step, members of the group presented the [Anti-trafficking Kit](#) which has been used to raise awareness

in religious life and ministry since 2003. The Act was motivated by the questions answered in the group discussion. Given that modern slavery is intricate and has many facets, it was made clear that Religious men and women need to work collaboratively with other agencies for the eradication of this crime against humanity. 2. OUTSIDE ROME

2.2 Remembering Martin Luther King. Each year, the third Monday of January is dedicated to celebrating the life and achievements of Martin Luther King, Jr. (1929-1968), an American civil rights leader whose campaign and efforts have led to the end of racial segregation on public transport and assertion of racial equality in the USA. This year the celebration falls on January 19th. How far can we say that his cause has been achieved? There are still many violations of human rights in many countries today. These include censorship of press, restrictions on the use of the internet, academic research, involuntary population relocation, repressive policies over ethnic, racial or religious minorities, discrimination against people with disabilities, prohibition or restriction on civil liberties such as nonviolent demonstrations. 2.3 South Sudan: between hope for peace to hold and displaced coping with trauma. Read Chris Herlinger's narrative of the situation in South Sudan. Despite progress in peace talks between conflicting factions (President Salva Kiir and the former Vice President Riek Machar), people remain skeptical that any agreement reached in Addis Ababa recently will be respected. Despite all fears and insecurity, people who witnessed violence are still traumatized and lack of food for the survivors is the worst challenge in this fragile situation. <http://ncronline.org/news/global/south-sudan-hopes-peace-hold-displaced-cope-trauma> Let us keep all those who are suffering in our prayer and ask the international community to act on the situation.

2.4 Denounce Qatar World Cup slavery. Qatar is set to host the Football World Cup in 2022, and by that time, at least 4,000 migrant workers will have died to make the city ready. Since 2012, roughly 900 workers have already been killed working on infrastructure for the World Cup. Never before have such a huge number of people died in any construction project in recent history. Workers describe forced labor in 50°C (122°F) heat, employers who steal their salaries and passports and being shuttled like cattle in overcrowded, unsanitary conditions without access to water or food. 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REMEMBERING THE BISHOPS WHO SIGNED THE PACT OF THE CATACOMBS

*(In 2015, each issue of **Newsbrief** will feature a bishop who signed the Pact of the Catacomb. In this issue we feature Helder Camara, Giacomo Lercaro and Leonidas Proaño)*

HÉLDER PESSA CÂMARA



Born in Fortaleza, Brazil on February 7, 1909, [Hélder Pessa Câmara](#) was ordained a priest in 1931. He was consecrated a bishop in 1952 and appointed Auxiliary Bishop of Rio de Janeiro (1952-64) and

Archbishop of Olinda and Recife (1964-85). He died in Recife, Brazil on August 27, 1999. As archbishop in the poverty-stricken north-eastern part of the country during the most vicious period of western-supported military dictatorship, Câmara was a spiritual giant, and a complicated human being. His father was an accountant and his mother a primary school teacher. From the early years of priesthood, he campaigned for social change, especially talking against “unjust structures of poverty.” His place in history will be heavily influenced by one of his more memorable sayings, “When I feed the poor they call me a saint. When I ask why so many people are poor they call me a communist.”

LEONIDAS PROAÑO



Born in San Antonio de Ibarra, Ecuador in 1910, [Leonidas Proaño](#) was bishop of Riobamba from 1954 to 1985. He is known as the bishop of the poor and of the Indios together with other bishops who

signed the Pact of the Catacombs. He is said to

have made possible for the church, especially in Latin America, to come down to the people and work at their service. Leonidas Proaño became aware of the necessity to change the pyramidal structure of the Church, to give a Community dimension, right from his youth age through his participation in the youth movement, Catholic Action, by employing the See–Judge–Act methodology which he used in his pastoral ministry as priest and bishop. He and 55 pastoral workers were detained by police in 1976 as reaction to these initiatives. In the light of the Pact of the Catacombs, the poor were put at the center of the pastoral work of the Church in the process of building the “church of the people.” Monsignor [Proaño](#) died in 1988. GIACOMO LERCARO



[Giacomo Lercaro](#) is definitely one of the representative figures as far as Vatican II is concerned, mainly because of an intervention he made at the end of the first session (December 6, 1962).

He proposed to the Council Fathers to take the theme of “the mystery of Christ among the poor” as a center of teaching and doctrine of the work of renewal of the whole Council.^[1] He is reported to have said, “The mystery of Christ in the Church has been there always, but especially today, the mystery of Christ in the poor because the Church is the Church of all, but especially the Church of the poor.” Read more at <http://www.newyorker.com/magazine/1967/09/09/letter-from-vatican-city-12> and <http://www.umbrales.edu.uy/articulos/pobres.php>.
